Letter from the President

This year has flown by, and I can't believe I'm writing my final President's letter. I'm grateful for the opportunity to lead this wonderful group and am proud to reflect on what our organization has accomplished together.



First and foremost, I'm pleased to share that I have officially passed

the gavel to Blake Birkel as our new NWEA President. I have no doubt that under his capable leadership, NWEA will carry on the mission with the same commitment and passion.

Blake knocked it out of the park with his Fall Conference planning leadership. We had a record number of vendors in the exhibit hall and great participation from all four organizations, NWEA, NS-AWWA, SWANA and APWA. He also led the charge for signing an agreement for event management. Listening to member feedback, we brought on Expo Pass to elevate our fall conference experience. With streamlined badge printing, CEU tracking, and meal coordination we aimed to create a smoother, more efficient experience for all attendees. I also wanted to highlight the Women in Water Breakfast and Poker Tournament. Both are fantastic events and continue to have record attendance!

I am proud to share that we updated and merged the Constitution and Bylaws into a single, cohesive document, which was approved by our membership. A big thank you to Jeremy Walker for leading that effort. As part of this update, we also adopted a new Code of Conduct, reinforcing our commitment to integrity and accountability within our organization.

In addition, we are focused on enhancing our communications. This year, we signed a partnership with Kelman Services to revitalize the Effluent Line, aiming to bring a fresh look and enriched content that will keep our members informed and engaged. These new publications are set to launch in the first quarter of next year.

This year, we had the opportunity to utilize grant funds to support the University of Nebraska's workforce development initiative for teachers. Approximately 20 high school teachers attended the event this summer, which included a tour of Olsson and a dinner. This initiative is focused on educating teachers about the water and wastewater industry, with the goal of inspiring students to consider careers in this field. We are proud to have committed, along with NSAWWA, to supporting this initiative for two years, as it directly impacts the future workforce in our industry.

Our dedication to building connections extended to WEFMAX, where seven of our members traveled to three different locations. Their active engagement with industry professionals from across the nation strengthens our network and brings valuable insights back to our organization. We strongly encourage any NWEA member to attend a WEFMAX if interested. In 2025, the locations and dates are Oklahoma City, OK April 2-4; Salem, MA April 30- May 2; and Palm Springs, CA June 4-6. Our member association is slated to host a WEFMAX event in the next few years.

Financially, our organization remains strong. Diligent management has positioned NWEA well to continue investing in our members and initiatives, ensuring our continued growth and impact.

In closing, I want to extend my heartfelt thanks to each of you. Your engagement, enthusiasm, and support have made these achievements possible. As we look to the future, I am confident that NWEA will continue making a meaningful impact on the water and wastewater industry.

What We Do

Our Milestones

Key Accomplishments (2018–2023)

- 2018/2019: Maintained communication with membership utilizing the NWEA website, social media, emails, and the newsletter.
- 2020: Helped the community navigate the challenges of Covid-19 with enhanced outreach like targeted initiatives with direct email containing critical safety information to operators and other entities.
- **2021:** Held the first PCOC retreat, realigning goals and sharpening our focus.
- 2022: Launched the first webcast, opening new channels for member interaction.
- 2023: Focused on diversifying our voice, boosting volunteer efficiency, maintaining The Effluent Line, and supporting virtual events.

The Effluent Line

This year, we published four editions of *The Effluent Line*, NWEA's official publication. Exciting changes are ahead:

- Starting Q1 2025, Kelman Services will take over production, reducing volunteer workload and potentially generating revenue:
 - 2025–2026: No cost to NWEA; Kelman oversees production.

■ **2027 and beyond:** NWEA will receive \$500 per issue and 10% of ad revenue exceeding \$15,000 per issue.

Looking to 2025

As we step into the next chapter, our goals include:

- Deepening collaboration with Kelman Services to streamline newsletters and branding.
- Launching a formal advertisement strategy to maximize revenue opportunities.
- Considering external support for website administration and assistance expanding website functionality.
- Expanding social media reach by reviving NWEA's Facebook presence.
- Fostering collaboration across committees to produce timely, relevant content.

Navigating Challenges and Embracing Opportunities

Adapting to evolving needs and overcoming branding constraints have been learning experiences for the PCOC. The partnership with Kelman Services is a transformative step, freeing volunteers to focus on strategic priorities while ensuring high-quality publications and outreach.

The Road Ahead

The PCOC is poised to continue its mission of impactful communication, innovation, and engagement. Beyond newsletters and social media, our work connects people, ideas, and solutions, amplifying the collective voice of the water environment sector.

Together, we will keep pushing boundaries, embracing opportunities, and making a lasting difference for NWEA and the community we serve.

Honoring Chris Koenig



Women in Water Fall Conference Breakfast 2024

The journey of our Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DE&I) committee hasn't been without its challenges. Early on, it was tough to find the right balance between meaningful conversation and productive outcomes. But in our third year of event planning, we've refined our approach, creating events that resonate with participants and foster an inclusive community. Our semi-annual breakfast and lunch gatherings, which alternate between the Great Plains Conference in La Vista and the Fall Joint Conference in Kearney, have become a cornerstone of this effort. These events now serve as more than just a chance to network—they are an essential platform for building connections, igniting dialogue, and generating purpose to the committee's values.

Our "Women in Water" (WiW) events are designed to provide a safe space for everyone, particularly those looking for community and solidarity in the water and environmental sectors. They've proven invaluable in fostering authentic relationships and conversations that go beyond surface-level networking.

One of the standout elements of our events is the atmosphere we create. By kicking off each gathering with a casual icebreaker and a meal, we help participants relax and fuel up before diving into more complex discussions. This informal setting encourages attendees to interact more freely, giving them the chance to connect with others they might not typically engage with during the busy conference schedule. And when those deeper conversations begin often touching on a range of personal, professional, and societal issues—it's much easier to be vulnerable and open, knowing that everyone is there with a shared purpose.

To ensure that our events remain productive and stay on track, moderators are tasked with facilitating conversations around carefully selected topics, ensuring that discussions stay solution-oriented. With the ability to prepare beforehand, moderators guide attendees toward discussions that explore real-life challenges, identify best practices, and suggest improvements. By framing conversations in a positive, solution-driven way, moderators keep the group energized and forward-thinking, fostering a culture of collaboration and mutual support within the industry.

Key Topics and Questions

The success of these events hinges largely on the topics we choose to discuss. These questions and topics are carefully chosen to encourage reflective and forward-thinking conversations:

Finding Success through Different Stages of Life

 Have you ever experienced an event that has drastically changed your life and/or career path? How did your company (coworker, management, mentor, etc.) or a professional organization assist you during this time?

Bystander Intervention

· What are some reasons you might not intervene in a situation where someone needs help? ie: fear of personal safety, not knowing how to intervene, not realizing it's happening. How does one balance their personal safety and well-being with the responsibility to intervene?

Professional Development & Mentorship

· Do you feel as though you grow more with a mentor with a similar or different mindset to yours? And why? What are the benefits to both sides?

Generational Differences

 Have you noticed differences in preferred communication among generations? How have you navigated the communication differences? ie: Phone call, video call, email, or text.

Beyond serving as a kick-off for conferences, these events act as a launchpad for the rest of the year. They help attendees refocus, realign, and set goals for personal and professional development. While the challenges facing the water and environmental sectors are many, these gatherings are a reminder that the work we do is important and that we are all in it together. Hello everyone thanks for taking the time to read this or at least making sure that this fine publication is placed in the recycle bin and not the trash. I have been asked to do this a few times by Super-Superintendent Jeff Saltzman and left him hanging on a number of promises to get this to him for inclusion in the latest Effluent



Line. I am sitting here about an hour and half before the latest deadline and I suppose its time to rise to the occasion and provide something. I was given a number of questions to pick from for this member spotlight, but like usual I am going to do what I want and tell it how I see it. So get ready for the my story when it comes to this great industry and how it all was set into motion and why I am so happy it did.

I fell into a career in wastewater, I would like to say only figuratively but I would be lying if I said I haven't fallen in literally also. I wasn't a studious or well-behaved student in high school but I was good at problem solving and meeting a deadline, lots of homework done the morning it was due. Well, the ACT proved I was good at problem solving and a meeting between my college entry councilor and dad confirmed that engineering, specifically that of the civil kind would be my route of studies. I was present at the meeting but had little input in the conversation, by choice, if this seems like I was being railroaded into something I had little desire for. Cue 5.5 years later and I'm the proud owner of a bachelors of science in civil engineering from the powerhouse school of the University of Nebraska at Omaha. UNO being a commuter school at the time I made little room for traditional career shaping exercises like clubs, internships, and other networking opportunities. So I found myself making pizzas at Big Freds and trying to decide what to do with my degree, including a brief flirtation with Marines that ended with me getting up in the middle of my military entry process procedure and requesting the first cab out of there, buts that's a longer story for a different time. I continued the process of falling into my career by taking the first job that I was offered which was apparently the one that nobody else wanted. I accepted a position as an entry level engineer for the Indian Health Service on the Pine Ridge Indian

Reservation in South Dakota. Providing community and individual water and wastewater services to the residents of Pine Ridge was our primary goal. The remote location, large service area, distant supervision, crime and poverty factors of the region all made this a particularly challenging position for a first-time engineer. But the client interaction, field testing for design, ROW and Land Ownership issues, Contracting and Bidding, Inspection, and many other duties that might be shared by a team were the sole responsibility of me. Although only a few years of my career were spent there it taught me valuable lessons that I still use today. Most importantly it taught me how to take a project from conception to operation, and all the roadblocks that exist in that path, and the confidence to make decisions best on the best-known info and move forward.

Although I was sad to be done with the people and the area that I came to know as family and friends, I was happy to get back to one of what I considered the one of the best cities in the US, the City of Omaha. Getting on with the City of Omaha with its benefits, work life balance, and stability was a great opportunity in my mind. Even with all those silver linings you might be surprised how many times in the first two years I thought about quitting and trying something else. There are only so many curb access ramps one can design before you are having nightmares about them. Once again, I fell into another opportunity that shaped my career. An engineering position opened up at the Papio WWTP and I was asked if I would be interested. If it was the Indian Health Service that helped shape me into my professional self, it was at Papio where what I am today was truly chiseled into being. It provided me the opportunity to take those small project lessons and apply them to multi-million-dollar designs and hundreds of millions of dollar construction projects. They say it takes a village and I could not agree more. I have had so many people, Plant Management, Plant O&M Staff, Public Works Support Staff, Consultants, Contractors, Regulators, Equipment Vendors, Utilities, and many others help me along the way. If I am able to give back half of what was shared with me, I will be a lucky man.
